# From the Vicarage:

# So, Revd Tony, who is 'In' and who is 'Out' as far as God is concerned?

What a question!

Religion has been accused of, and responsible for, 'excluding' an awful lot of people through history. When the slave trade was at its height, people from the African Continent were seen as 'less that human', and therefore bought and sold as property. (The Church of England is currently trying to redress its historic sins by setting up a fund of over £100 million to, somehow, pay redress for its involvement in this abhorrent trade in history). Unmarried mothers were 'taken away', as were their children. Those whose life choices were so limited that they had to revert to criminal activity, prostitution or to living outside of acceptable society were ostracised.

In some cultures, religion placed people in social groups (casts) which limited their opportunities and status in society. Women have been treated as lesser beings than men; the sick and the lame have been seen as bearing a punishment from God, for their own sins or those of their Fathers. Those whose sexuality didn't conform to the 'religious norm' (by that I mean people who were gay!) have been excluded and seen as something 'broken and sinful'.

All in all, Religion has continually sent out a message (and I can only speak for Christianity here!) that the dividing line between those that are 'In' and those that are 'Out' is both clear, determined in our scriptures, and for some reason, important for the purity of the faith.

So, after 52 years since I first decided to 'Follow Jesus' I have come to these conclusions.

First, at the time I said 'Yes!' to following Jesus I was a racist, drug dealing little thug. I always wondered where I fitted, felt on the outside of



everything and, therefore, acted up to be the Big Cheese and the hard man (Boy Really!). When I encountered Jesus, what I heard was something so simple: 'All have sinned and fallen short of the Glory of God' (Romans 3:23). It seemed to me that meant me, plus the Vicar and the Archbishop of Canterbury ... anyone on the planet was in the same position! I then heard,

<sup>6</sup> For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' John 3: 16

So, for me to start with ... we are all in the same boat and yet, God makes himself available to each and every one of us.

Very early on, I started to hear that there were some people I shouldn't mix with if I wanted to stay 'Pure'. But then, as I read the New Testament and looked at the life of Jesus, what did I see?

Jesus said some strange things:

### Mark 2:17

And when Jesus heard it, he said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I came not to call the righteous, but sinners."

### Luke 15:2

And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

### Luke 5:32

"I have not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance."

### Matthew 9:13

"Go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice.' For I came not to call the righteous, but sinners."

So, on the basis, that we are all a bit broken and damaged (no matter what the issue), Jesus seems to have come to call 'ME' or 'US' into his way! So then I thought ... so can I differentiate between who is out and who is in ?

Well, no, not really ... simply because it's not my job as a follower of Jesus to do any judging.

See what Jesus said:

### Luke 6 37-42

"Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven."

### Matthew 7-12

7 "Judge not, that you be not judged. <sup>2</sup> For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and with the measure you use it will be measured to you. <sup>3</sup> Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? <sup>4</sup> Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? <sup>5</sup> You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye. John 8:

**7** When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." James 4:11-12

<sup>11</sup> Brothers and sisters, do not slander one another. Anyone who speaks against a brother or sister or judges them speaks against the law and judges it. When you judge the law, you are not keeping it, but sitting in judgment on it. <sup>12</sup> There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the one who is able to save and destroy. But you—who are you to judge your neighbour?

A lot of bible stuff in there, but here is the crux! It is not for us to judge. We are all 'below par on the Holy front'. I hold to one thing that St Paul said in his letter to the Romans: Can anything ever separate us from Christ's love? Does it mean He no longer loves us if we have trouble or calamity, or are persecuted, or hungry, or destitute, or in danger, or threatened with death? ... No, despite all these things, overwhelming victory is ours



through Christ, who loved us. And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow — not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below — indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:35, 37-39)

Our God, Our Father, who sent Jesus to spend his time with fishermen, tax collectors, prostitutes, lepers and those excluded from society, simply wants each of us to be all that he created us to be. If we fail or fall, he still accepts us; if we don't fit the social norm, he still accepts us. If we challenge the current perceived perceptions, he still loves and encourages us.

52 years ago, I discovered that God loved me! No matter what I'd done, no matter where I'd been, no matter who I was. His love was unshakable.

### So, 'who is in and who is out?'

If anyone wants to know how God will judge us, the judgement is not based on race, social status, sexuality, political preference or any other criteria that we might think we can judge people for.

It seems to me it is based on the parable of the sheep and the goats that Jesus shared in *The Gospel of Matthew. Chapter 25 v 31 - 46*.

God is the only one who can make that call. Until then, I am called to accept and encourage everyone, whoever they are, whatever their condition in life, whatever their history or background. NO EXCEPTIONS!

### Home cured bacon by Gene Marshall

In the last magazine I read "What's the use of a pig" with interest and was reminded of the flitch of bacon that, in my childhood, was hung, draped in muslin, on the scullery wall every year.

We did not have our own pig but my dad bought a flitch from his sister who raised pigs and cured the bacon. However there was a slight problem. Dad was not tall enough to slip the strong loop of string over the hook. He solved this by getting the flitch on his back with Mum behind, taking some of the weight. He would climb on to a kitchen chair and be poised to slip the loop over the hook when he would feel Mum shaking with suppressed laughter and collapse himself. Several abortive attempts later - success! I looked forward to this family fun every year.

However, when I was five, Aunt Kate decided she would cure the bacon at our house. The pig bench was carried from the shed to the pavement outside the back door. It was much wider than a normal bench with a groove near the edge all the way round. Aunt Kate arrived and I was delighted to be allowed to assist. She patiently explained the process as, all morning, we rubbed in salt and some saltpeter. I don't think so much of the latter was used. I remember clearly that, near the end of the process, she sent me in the house to fetch pepper to sprinkle, as a deterrent to flies, where the bones in the shoulder and ham came near the surface.

I have no memory of where the flitch was put to complete the curing process. I think it would have remained on the bench and perhaps put in the brick built shed in the garden. It would be interesting to know how long it took.

### The Garden Battle

Last year I took on the responsibility for a neglected garden. It had been much loved in the past but age and infirmity meant that the former owner had not pruned shrubs or trees, thinned out plants nor even mown the grass for some years. The grass was easily dealt with thanks to a delightful chap who comes once a fortnight or so with an enormous and noisy mower. The shrubs are gradually being tamed but the fruit trees are all growing into each other and will probably need a specialist to sort them out.

I decided that, living on the edge of the Forest, a cottage garden would be the design to go for. Much as I love the drifts of single colour which Gertrude Jekyll and others made so popular, that sort of exuberant expanse of colour works best in a much larger border than I have and I do like the muddle of plants that a cottage garden can support.

And vegetables. The cabbage family in particular provide a structure that works well threaded through the flowers. Nasturtiums look good against the dark green of kale and the occasional glimmer of the white curds of a cauliflower provides an unexpected contrast to penstemons. I planted 18 members of the cabbage family. Six beautiful purple kale, six green kale and six sprouting broccoli. I dotted them through where the geranium are pushing out their leaves and in amongst the herb patch by the kitchen door. One, just one, plant remains. And the two new delphinium, planted at the same time, have vanished.

I say vanished. The culprit is known, they did not bother to hide their shiny, silvery trail. Slugs. I can see no good reasons for a slug. Except, perhaps as bird food.

We are told that gardening is a relaxing hobby, much lauded for the peace and tranquility working in a garden can bring to busy 21<sup>st</sup> century lives.

Not so in my garden. There is a battle going on. Me v The Slug.

### **English Bicknor Primary School**

The day was made even more memorable by the arrival of six calves within the 24 hours preceding the visit.

On their return to school Oak Class wrote this delightful letter of thanks.

Dear Farmer Phil and Daphne,

We are very thankful to have had the opportunity to visit your farm.

Seeing Joyce milked was a wonderful experience and we found it interesting how you only need one milking cow to be able to have plenty of milk. The calves were adorable and it was also interesting to see how energetic they were after only being alive for twenty-four hours. We found it fascinating that cows grow so fast and could easily observe the differences between the new calves, the one-year olds and the two-year olds. We loved hearing about the different names you give to your calves and looking at how different each breed was.

The tractor ride to the woods was fun. Having time to reflect outdoors amongst the trees really helped us to calm down and the bird sounds were lovely to listen to. We enjoyed building the birds' nests and measuring the trees, particularly when we found ones the same age as us.

Making butter from cream was really hard but enjoyable at the same time. Everyone became very competitive and the group that made the butter first were over the moon.

We all really enjoyed the trip.

# ENGLISH BICKNOR LOCAL HISTORY GROUP Goodrich Castle: A History

Talk by Alex Knight Meeting of 14 March 2024

Before there was a castle, there was possibly an Iron Age hillfort on the site (aerial photos show possible early earthworks). There are some Roman tiles built into one of the castle walls – quite probably there was a Roman period building here after the fort. The Llandaff Charters then refer to Constantine's church being built at Garth Benni- so was an early Medieval monastery next on the site? The first reference to a castle is around 1100, and as the land was given by William the Conqueror to the Anglo-Saxon Godric around 1087 we can be pretty sure it was not built by a Norman. (Although it is not referred to in Domesday, that does not mean it was not there earlier – Hereford had only one milkmaid in 1086 according to the record, which is inconceivable!).

The site is geographically important; with river crossings at Flaynesford, Walford (the name comes from Welshman's Ford) and the Goodrich ferry. First would have been an earth ringwork.

Godric's daughter – Hwice – married William fitzBaderon of Monmouth, who added the Castle to all his other estates then passed it to his son. Around this time the stone keep was constructed as the Welsh needed suppressing. The keep is 16m tall with an earth embankment and wooden steps up to the keep door on the second floor. All this earth was later spread around the courtyard, giving the height change we see today.

Goodrich was an important spot during The Anarchy (the civil war that followed the drowning of Henry I's heir and saw years of fighting between Empress Matilda and Stephen of Blois).

The Castle was generally passed down the female line as many heirs were lost. Male holders included 'Strongbow' in 1148. When Isabella married rich and powerful William Marshall he took on ownership. He was known as 'the perfect knight' and built lots of castles as well as rebuilding Chepstow and was Constable of St Briavels. It is likely he built the outer stone walls, of which only an obvious rough section with two arrow slits between the chapel and garderobe remains. He had five sons, but all died. His granddaughter inherited and married Henry III's half-brother – the Earl of Pembroke – who built most of what we see today as a status symbol and home between around 1260 and 1290.

Stone came from what is now the surrounding ditch, so underpinning was required. Timber came from the Forest of Dean by royal grant. Royal workmen were brought in to help with the build, and the similarities of the barbican to the Tower of London indicates this is one of the areas they worked on. There is some questionable workmanship, such as the arrow slits facing each other in the entrance!

In the 1500s the Talbots upgraded, with piped water (before this the 54m well was the water source) and some roofline changes (which left some fireplaces in odd places halfway up walls). When Talbot became Earl of Shrewsbury the castle was neglected and in 1619 the Crown sold it to the Earls of Kent.

Despite being a Border castle, little action was seen until the Civil War. It was used as a Royalist base for raids, with 60-80 horses and infantry stationed there. Colonel March took the Castle with canon, mortars and around 500 men. They cut off the water supply and had Roaring Meg made locally as the walls were too thick for the canon to make much impact. Roaring Meg fired 200lb exploding shells over the walls. It took two months of siege before surrender.

In 1647 Parliament ordered that Goodrich Castle be made unusable. The tenant (who had just invested in a major refurbishment) was responsible for this.

The picturesque ruin then became a highlight of The Wye Tour and has been a tourist site ever since.

### An easy solution

We are hearing more and more of young people being killed or seriously injured on our roads. We also hear the politicians discussing how the numbers can be reduced by educating the young.

I am afraid education is not the answer.

Young people all know the dangers and what they should or should not be doing, but once behind the wheel and their mates are in the car, the feeling that " it only happens to other people" takes over. They are driving small but tuned up cars, or cars that come with power as standard. And they lack experience.

There is an easy solution that I am sure would dramatically reduce road deaths among the young. The Government set the rules on who can and can't drive certain vehicles. I am now over 70 and not allowed to drive certain large and heavy vehicles that I have been driving for years, so if they can legislate for older people, why can they not legislate for the young?

There should be a limit to both the brake horse power (BHP) and CC, the size of the engine. If the rules were that anyone under 21 or anyone who has passed his /her test within 24 months if over 21, cannot drive any vehicle, except with an instructor, over, say , 75 BHP and 1,000 ccs, whichever is the highest , accidents would reduce. And in addition no more than 1 passenger allowed in the vehicle. The potential speed and acceleration of the vehicle would be dramatically reduced.

The old Morris Minors and Minis of the 60s and 70s had less than 50 BHP, and were usually 850-1,000 CCs, and were perfectly capable of travelling between 60 and 70 when required.

Some modern 1000 CC cars now are capable of very fast acceleration and can reach well over 100 miles an hour. It should be impossible for anyone with less than 2 years driving experience to get insurance, regardless of their age, on any car over the 75BHP or 1,000ccs and never for anyone 17 to 21 years.

There could be exceptions for Police drivers, Ambulance drivers, firemen, however, a further course should be required and the exception should be limited to when they are working. Company cars could come under the same regulations, and an advanced test taken in order to drive a company vehicle, with insurance being paid for by the company but again, the vehicle should only be used for work, and not for private use.

This may inconvenience a few; however, it would save many, many lives. If the Government feel that at 70 you should not drive certain vehicles unless a doctor says you are fit to do so, then I am sure a 17 to 21 year old behind the wheel of a powerful car poses a far greater threat than an experienced driver driving a small lorry and restrictions should apply.

A car manufacturer could make a lot of money building the "new driver" car. A small car, that comes within the levels of engine size and BHP allowed for new drivers that is reasonable to insure. These cars would be required for all new drivers, so sales would be high. The manufacturer could make them look cool or "sick" in teenage lingo.

I am available to stand as the next Transport Secretary if required.


